## From The Pulpit

## From our Minister, Elliot Swattridge

Dear family in Christ,

As I write this, we have been in Groomsport just over a month, and there's so much I could say! The way I have been overwhelmed with the beauty of the rainbow colours of the sky over the waters after sunset, the moon turning to fiery orange one Monday night, the glimpses of the Aurora, the friendly splashing of the pre-dawn surf, the beauty of the hearts of every one of vou who has shown me such undeserved kindness. The sheer romance of the heart of God in surrounding us with extravagant beauty- what could He want with us in surrounding us with artistic glory that makes every human art gallery seem mundane in comparison? How much we must mean to Him!

Yet I am struck that the highest beauty in His creation is the human person, soul, face, heart, mind- the ones made in His image, designed to be little mirrors dazzling like the sea in the dawning light.

The capacity for love that exists in our soul is dizzyingly vast. The heavy tragedy is how we have turned our wondrous capacities and used them for evil and cruelty in our world- but God created us for wholehearted love. Each person unique, unrepeatable, is a living colour, a hue of stained glass through which Christ longs to shine His light to illuminate our world in a way only they will. If only we could imagine how beautiful our world would be if everyone shone with the colour they were created for- how teeming with life!

Why are we here on this earth? What mission have we been entrusted with? These are questions I wrestle with more and more! Yet the phrase that comes to mind for me right now is "beacon of revival". In a world where deadness, mundane rubbish and desolation poison so much, suffocating the light, we are called to defiantly and boldly shine forth with the light of life.

"I am the light of the world.

Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness,

but will have the light of life."

(Jesus in John 8:12)

What a phrase that is, the "light of life"! Life that is so overflowing and filling that it is a form of light- the sort of light that darkness flees away from forever. The One who created the blazing sun calls Himself a light, a light filled with life- and imagine how powerful this 'life' is that is compared to the vast solar globe that roars at 15 billion degrees centigrade at its core and which is 1.3 million times the volume of our home planet. This is the One who says "I have come that they may have life, and have it to the full." (John 10:10) What must the fullness of life be when it is found in the One who dreamed it up in the first place, and in whose eyes the sun is less than a sparky ember from a campfire?


So our calling is wondrous- literally, if we understood it, we would be awestruck with wonder.

## Welcome Elliot!

Monday 21 August was a very special day in the life of our Parish when the church was packed to capacity for the Service of Introduction of our new Minister, Rev Elliot Swattridge. Joining the congregation were Elliot's wife Nomi, family members, clergy, our local MLA and other invited dignitaries, marking this as a very special occasion.

The service which was led by Archdeacon Ken Higgins and the Rt Rev David A McClay, Bishop of Down and Dromore, commenced with a procession of clergy during the opening hymn, Be Thou My Vision. The bible readings by Bert Smith and Daniel Jones, from Isaiah Chapter 62 and John Chapter 15 were chosen by Elliot. As many of you know Elliot was keen to ensure that all of the hymns were chosen by the congregation so after a straw poll, Be Still For the Presence of the Lord, I the Lord of sea and sky, Thine Be the Glory as well as the processional hymn were selected. Jubilate sang a lovely version of Thy Perfect Love- a very moving anthem.





A friend of Elliot's and Nomi's from Greystones, Nomi's hometown, the Ven. Ian Horner, Archdeacon of Kilmore gave the address. Speaking on the reading from John Chapter 15, based on 'I am the true Vine', he reminded us of the need to remain connected to God, the source of all life.

Following the call to Elliot to serve as our Priest in Charge by Bishop David, Elliot promised to faithfully serve Christ and his Church in Groomsport. He then addressed the congregation explaining that the parish's commitment to prayer, which he is passionate about , had attracted him to the post. He talked of the view of Blackhead Lighthouse which he could see from his window and how it reminded him of Jesus's proclamation 'I am the light of the World' and how through a deep connection to God our Father we could all be His light in the world. He told us that he didn't want to follow his own agenda but was inspired to see what God was doing in Groomsport and then join in. The Bishop closed the service with The Blessing.





Following the service everyone retired to the Canon Tyney Hall for refreshments some informal speeches and a chance to meet Elliot. Daniel and a group of young people played some traditional Irish music, which was very entertaining and rounded off a very special evening.

We wish Elliot and Nomi God's blessing and best wishes for their ministry with us.



# September Vestry Minutes

The Select Vestry were pleased to welcome Rev Elliot Swattridge to his first meeting. Elliot began the meeting with a reading and prayer.

Heather reported that she had written a number of thank you letters to ministers who had covered frequently during the vacancy. Elliot spoke about his Service of Introduction and shared how humbled he had felt, how welcome he and Nomi had felt and how impressed he had been with the level of organisation.

Following discussion about a proposed Art Exhibition in the Autumn, Barry is to follow up with discussions with David McKnight, the Hall Manager. Maureen is available for any discussions.

Elliot has introduced a new item onto the Agenda – Minister's reflections. He used a sprig from his garden to explain how, apart from bringing our own requests to God, we should also be looking to see where people do not have God in their lives. He is very keen to encourage prayer and is looking forward to starting a prayer group on Tuesday evenings before Compline. He is also looking forward to going into Towerview School in October, He finished by expressing thanks to everyone and, in particular, to his Warden, Bert, who had been so encouraging. ## Dear my family in Christ,

So... we're finally here! I feel I ought to begin by quoting the eminent Bert Smith, "The eagle has landed!" (Although after all the recent showers we feel more like ducks!) Wicklow down south- and we are both delighted to be on the island of Ireland! She is a children's therapist and currently completing her Masters. You'll probably bump into both of us on a beach walk with our wonderfully friendly and enthusiastic third member of our family - the golden labrador Wesley- named of course after the poet and hymnwriter Charles Wesley. Turns out he loves the local kelp here as an eco-friendly endless source of chew toys! We have been splashing around with him on the beautiful beaches here and meeting so many dog friends along the way.



So I just wanted to send this letter to you all to properly say 'Hello there!' as we begin to dabble our feet in this new adventure together! I love to think in pictures, and as I write this I see Blackhead Lighthouse shining across the Belfast Lough, and isn't this perfect for us? Just as Jesus proclaimed, "I am the light of the world" (John 8:12), He also said to us, "You are the light of the world." (Matt. 5:14) Where does this light come from? Like a lantern filled with a flame, we are bright only insofar as the One who is Light dwells in us. What if we fully took to heart the fact the One who is within our heart and souls is Light infinitely brighter than any sun? For "...greater is He that is in you than he that is in the world." (1 John 4:4) We have a shining Treasure glorious beyond any other to share with the world- and His Name is Jesus Christ.

"Very well," you might say, "but what's your plan?" Well, have you ever heard the saying, "Mission is seeing what God is doing and joining in"? The expositor Matthew Henry perceptively quipped, "When God intends great mercy for his people, he first of all sets them praying." The earliest signs, the littlest seedlings, of a life-changing move of God are a people who really love to spend time with Him in prayer! He gives us both the desire to pray and the ideas of what to pray for. So as we begin, I would love to invite everyone reading this is to talk to God about this simple question:

# Lord Jesus, what is Your Spirit laying on your heart to pray for next?

If anything comes to mind, whether tentatively or burning strong, please do tell me about it as would love to hear! As we move into Autumn, I am also hoping to begin a new prayer meeting on Tuesday evenings before Compline, so watch this space. Can we be like the "watchers on the walls" of Isaiah 62, crying out for His Church, that "her vindication shines out like the dawn"?

This is fuelled by God's wondrous delight in us, so great that Isaiah also cries out, "as the bridegroom rejoices over the bride, so shall your God rejoice over you!" What an invitation: to speak openly to the One who dwells brightly within us, rejoicing in us as His people with such beautiful and overwhelming love. And what belonging: to be connected to Jesus, part of His own body like branches of a vine, utterly dependent, attached in heart and soul, where He kindly reassures us, "Those who abide in me and I in them. bear much fruit, because apart from me you can do nothing." (John 15:5) We don't have to do any of this on our own- and indeed we can't even if we wanted to!

I am amazed at the privilege it is to be amongst you all, and look forward to chatting, laughing, praying and sharing life, Communion and worship with you all. Let's gently and lovingly nurture those seedlings of Christ's new life in one another!

**"To this You belong."** Yes, this is the One to whom we belong!

It felt really liberating to be able to put my money to such a good use, Paul and Timothy work tirelessly and if they can come back here to my home and be fed and cared for I think there is no better use for my wealth.

# Baxter's Requiem Matthew Crow

"I'm afraid it's not good news, Mr Baxter". So begins this story as the doctor visits the ninety-four year old in his retirement home. Not, you may think a particularly enticing start to a story, but bear with it and you will be rewarded with a witty, touching and charming story of love, loss, memories and learning. Baxter is a wonderful character, learned, a splendid raconteur, sometimes sardonic but caring and thoughtful. He



also remains a man who can find real enjoyment in good food, music and friendship. He is not, however, a good patient at the Melrose Retirement home where he has been forced to go after falling downstairs at his home. He challenges

authority at every turn. On arrival he announces that "It's like being dead and paying for the privilege!" He dislikes the 'limp' meals he is served and regrets the fact that his wide circle of friends has diminished "incrementally in an inevitable carousel of overpriced wreaths, tuneless hymns and hastily defrosted vol-au-vents". He befriends an unhappy nineteen-year

old who has recently joined the staff at the home, and together they, embark on an extraordinary, moving and entirely unauthorised adventure. I can warmly recommend this story, it had me laughing and sighing in equal measure, and I suspect that, like me, you will come to love Baxter.


# Notes on a Scandal Zoe Heller

I remembered watching this when it was on television some years ago and decided to read it when I noticed it among our books in the hall. I should say from the beginning that the story involves the taboo subject of a



relationship between a pupil and teacher, which some of you may prefer not to read. The main thrust of the plot however is the rather sinister figure of Barbara Covet, a long standing member of staff at the school who becomes convinced that the new teacher, the somewhat bohemian and unconventional art teacher Sheba Hart, is to be a kindred spirit. Barbara is a solitary, aging woman with little in her life and she becomes obsessed with Sheba. The story is told by Barbara so the illicit relationship is described by her as she uncovers it and sets herself. up as Sheba's defender whilst trying to draw Sheba away from her foolhardy passion and into close relationship with herself. What initially seems to be a sordid forbidden relationship quickly becomes a sinister unveiling of a driven, misguided woman. This is not everyone's cup of tea, I acknowledge, but it is quite addictive and extremely powerful.

## The Unlikely Pilgrimage of Harold Fry Rachel Joyce



I saw the film of this book recently in Bangor with a friend so was delighted to find it to read and review. This really is an unlikely story as its title suggests; it is touching, amusing in parts, beautifully observed and despite not exactly being action

packed it becomes hard to put down. At least I found it so! One morning as Harold and his wife of many years sit down to breakfast, he opens a letter from an ex colleague which tells him that she is in a hospice and she is writing to say goodbye. Inevitably he is at a loss to know how to reply, he has not seen her for many years but was fond of her and deep down feels that he owes her a debt. After breakfast he leaves his almost permanently irritated wife, Maureen, to her vacuuming, and sets off, with a rather inadequate note to Queenie, his ex-colleague, to the nearest letterbox. In an altogether out of character moment when he reaches the letterbox he hesitates, then decides not to post it there but to walk on to the next box. He stops at a petrol station to buy a snack and it is here that he meets his first

stranger in a chapter entitled "Harold and the Garage Girl and a Question of Faith". This encounter is destined to have a profound effect on him and the letter remains un-posted. Shortly after he makes a phone call from a box to the hospice where Queenie is now, leaving a message for her that he is on his way to see her, walking, and that she must wait for him. As the sketched map at the beginning of this book makes clear, Harold lives in Kingsbridge on the South West coast of England and Queenie's hospice is in Berwick-Upon-Tweed on the North East coast of England. As his walk continues, Harold reflects on his life, at home, at work, with Maureen and the tragedy which has served to keep them apart for many years. Alongside this, the normally reserved Harold meets and befriends many people all of whom are beautifully described and well rounded, In addition to this his journey, the countryside and the weather are depicted in wonderfully evocative writing. I have to recommend this story.

Enjoy your reading and I hope you find something to please you amongst the books.





## Opportunities Made Available (OMA): Chris and Gloria Dima, Gulu, Uganda

OMA is a social help group run by Chris and Gloria. The Parish has been supporting it for a number of years. We built their website and paid for its initial upkeep. Our early donations allowed them to buy two sewing machines. These and subsequent purchases have enabled OMA to teach young girls (many of whom had dropped out of school and lived on the streets), new work skills which they can use to support themselves and their families.

However OMA is now struggling financially. The Dimas finance most of OMA with their own money. Unfortunately Chris and Gloria's recent bouts of ill health have reduced their income. They are unable to pay the rent on their premises. Ultimately the Dimas and the girls they support, could end up on the street.

The work of OMA has been inspired by Chris and Gloria's deep Christian faith, and their unflinching commitment to help those in great need across their community. They have undoubtedly enabled many young girls to break out of the vicious cycle of poverty and destitution, which had become a cruel and unyielding feature of their and their families everyday lives.

Chris and Gloria have appealed directly to our Parish for help. We cannot in all truth turn them away.

Many of us of course have our own domestic pressures to face. But if you would like to help OMA with a financial contribution, however modest, then please speak to Elliot or the Wardens who will be happy to help.

## Archive News by Barry

The Parish of Groomsport Archives are a full record of the Parish from its creation as a Chapel of Ease in 1842. In addition, items pertaining to the village and district are also included.

Any archive should be supplied with every document, photograph or otherwise formatted item which pertains to the organisation which it represents. This should happen as a matter of course. The Parish Archives are no different.

The Parish Archives Catalogue presently numbers over 500 entries, many of which contain multiple items. Amongst these can be found:

- 1. Select Vestry Minutes from 1871 to 2022. There are earlier volumes from 1842, presently held in Dublin.
- 2. Baptismal Registers from 1876 to 2004 and Marriage Registers from 1869 to 1982. These Registers have all been digitised and are available for enquiries.
- 3. A Photographic Archive of Groomsport heritage from 1800's to the present. This includes photos of the contents of Cockle Row.
- 4. A collection of Bibles from 1861 to the present. These include lectern Bibles presented by parishioners and some special editions. The theological library in the Parish Halls is part of this collection.
- 5. The Visitors Book in the Church Porch. This is part of the Archive collection.

Since it was installed in 2016 it has been signed by visitors from every continent on Farth.

6. A full photographic record of all major events/features which have taken place in the Parish since 2014, together with some earlier items.

She also wishes you to know that the group welcomes all ages and all those who have lost someone important to them.





## Some personal reflections by our Archivist Barry

What then is Christianity? The Bible tells us how St. Paul took the Christian faith to the world beyond Judea, to the Ephesians, the Corinthians, the Thessalonians, the Romans etc. Yet Paul (Saul, Saulus) remains one of the most controversial figures in history. We know that an irrevocable schism occurred between him and the Nazarene family of Jesus together with the surviving disciples. Saul of Tarsus was born of a well to do Hebrew family, he was highly intelligent, a Roman citizen, he never knew Jesus in the flesh and his job was to hunt down rebels and dissidents, including the followers of Jesus/Yeshuah. This occupation he pursued, by all accounts, with dedication and relish. Then, on the road to Damascus he dramatically and miraculously undergoes conversion when he ceases to be Saul of Tarsus and becomes Paul. follower of Christ. Yet in his new persona he was still as much an "enemy" of the family and disciples of Jesus as before. Could it be that Saul/Paul simply saw that he was not going to get what he wanted by persecution and that he would be better to use their ideas for his own ends? If you can't beat them join them! Or perhaps use them.

Thus Paul, the ultimate opportunist, did achieve greatness in his own lifetime and perhaps amongst his "conversions" the most important one was himself. Certainly he was prepared to die and did so for what he believed.

While James and the disciples made of

Christ's teachings a new force in Palestine, they were, nevertheless, limited by having known Jesus as a man. Paul did not and there is no doubt that he created what we call Christianity which was summarily hijacked by the Church in Rome just as he had done from James and the other Nazarenes

Is it the case that the Church's teachings are still based on the medieval and pre-medieval perception of religious observance: one which suited people whose knowledge, vision and horizons were very limited by comparison with today? Even now with all our knowledge and modern technologies are we really any different, relatively speaking, to our medieval forbears? We see things we do not understand: we are aware of things which are beyond our comprehension. We cling to a perceived reality which fits the limits of our understanding, but the ultimate reality to which we would aspire will always be just beyond our grasp.

We are specks, billions of us, (not to mention the other creatures) on this Earth of ours. This Earth of ours is one of nine or more planetary bodies within our solar system – little more than a large speck on the face of our Sun. Our Solar system is a speck on the edge of the galaxy we call the Milky Way. That Galaxy is a speck within the known universe. The Universe, known and unknown, is infinite – has no end and no understood beginning.

What then is God? What, who, where,

how, when is God? The simple answer is we do not know and because we are ultimately afraid of what we do not know or understand we create an image to which we can relate and which we tell ourselves we do understand. Genesis says God created man in his own image. Rather, we have created God in our image. Gradually over eons of time, from the primeval to the present we have tried to create a structure, religion, recognisable to our finite minds. In doing so we have somehow lost the ability of being able to accept that there is an unknown far beyond our understanding and we have lost the ability to allow ourselves the wonder, freedom and joy of that acceptance. William Wordsworth, who was not a conventional "Christian", felt it in Intimations of Immortality (Stanza 5) and Lines Composed Above Tintern Abbey

## "And I have felt

A presence that disturbs me with the joy
Of elevated thoughts; a sense sublime
Of something far more deeply interfused,
Whose dwelling is the light of setting
suns,

And the round ocean, and the living air

And the blue sky, and in the mind of man:

A motion and a spirit that impels

All thinking things, all objects of all thought,

And rolls through all things."

William Wordsworth

## Ourselves and Our Prayers

We tend to think of prayer as our simply talking to God. After all, that's what we have been told and taught from our earliest years. It's what we did in Sunday School and maybe still do in our daily devotions. In Church we pray together, sharing the words. Yet this is only a part, a lesser part even, of what prayer is or should be. Professor William Barclay was a distinguished Biblical scholar, an exceptionally gifted preacher and a prolific Christian writer and broadcaster for over four decades. This is just a little of what he had to say about ourselves and our prayers, from his book "The Plain Man's Book of Prayers":

"Prayer is not a monologue in which we do all the talking; prayer is listening even more than it is talking. The highest form of prayer is silence, when we wait on God and listen to God. We have a low view of prayer if we regard prayer as a way of telling God what we want Him to do; prayer is even more listening to God, as He tells us what He wants us to do. Prayer is not a way of making use of God: prayer is a way of offering ourselves to God in order that He should be able to make use of us. It may be that one of our great faults in prayer is that we talk too much and listen too little. When prayer is at its highest we wait in silence for God's voice to us; we linger in His presence for His peace and His power to flow over us and around us; we lean back in His everlasting arms and feel the serenity of perfect security in Him". IWS

## The Story behind the Hymn

Will your anchor hold in the storms of life, when the clouds unfold their wings of strife? When the strong tides lift, and the cables strain, will your anchor drift, or firm remain?

Refrain: We have an anchor that keeps the soul steadfast and sure while the billows roll; fastened to the Rock which cannot move, grounded firm and deep in the Saviour's love!

Will your anchor hold in the straits of fear, when the breakers have told the reef is near? through the tempest rage, and the wild winds blow, not an angry wave shall our barque o'erflow?

Will your anchor hold in the floods of death, when the waters cold chill your latest breath? On the rising tide you can never fail, while your anchor holds within the veil.

Will your eyes behold through the morning light the city of gold and the harbour bright? Will you anchor safe by the heav'nly shore, when life's storms are past for evermore?

Priscilla Jane Owens was born in 1829 in Baltimore, Maryland. She remained in Baltimore throughout her life, dedicating her years to teaching Sunday school at the Union Square Methodist Episcopal Church. Known for her enthusiasm and commitment to Christian education, she penned several hymns primarily for children and young people, aiming to guide them in their spiritual journey including "Will your anchor hold".

## Inspiration Behind the Hymn

The primary inspiration for "Will Your Anchor Hold" comes from Hebrews 6:19: entereth into that within the veil." "Which hope we have as an anchor of the soul,

both sure and steadfast, and which entereth into that within the veil." This verse beautifully compares the hope in Christ to a steadfast anchor that holds firm regardless of the stormy seas of life.

## The Hymn's Message


The hymn's lyrics emphasize the symbolism of an anchor, underscoring its stability, reliability, and strength. The repeated questions – "Will your anchor hold...?" – serve as a reflective prompt for listeners, urging them to consider the strength and foundation of their own faith.

Throughout the verses, Owens paints vivid pictures of life's trials, such as the "strains of life" and the "fearful hour." Yet, she contrasts these challenges with the strength and security found in Jesus, the "Solid Rock."

The chorus then answers the hymn's primary question with a resounding affirmation of the anchor's – or one's faith's – stability: "We have an anchor that keeps the soul / Steadfast and sure while the billows roll."

"Will Your Anchor Hold" is more than just a hymn; it's a reflection on the nature of faith in the face of life's storms. Priscilla Jane Owens masterfully weaves scripture, personal reflection, and poetic imagery to remind believers of the unchanging, steadfast nature of Jesus Christ, our anchor. Whenever the hymn is sung in churches or gatherings, it serves as a comforting reminder of God's unwavering presence in our lives, urging us to hold fast to our faith.


